

#### An Opportunity Presents Itself

Natural conversation between peers led to a desire to formalize an approach to self-advocacy and peer-mentoring

Care Team brainstorm session — How can a situation like this help us be proactive as opposed to reactive?

Modeled on Circle of Friends approach

Buddy Circles began in the 2012-2013 school year as a way to introduce and acclimate new students

## A Measure of Understanding & Inclusion

 Initially began as a way to support relationships and self-perceptions of students with disabilities
Social, Behavioral, Academic



K It's all of our responsibility to educate and advocate

Organically transitioned to consider various types of diversity

Ability, family structure, gender identification,

## Being a Buddy: A Daily Practice

Each student has the opportunity to share, learn, partner, and support

No matter the dynamic, they are learning about the responsibility within a community, and doing the work that tells them they are a valued part of the community

"What happens in a Buddy Circle stays in a Buddy Circle"

"As Buddies we take care of each other's hearts. Buddies are someone you can talk to, and trust."

### What Does a Buddy Circle Look Like?

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A Buddy Circle is comprised of:

A Center: Student who is the focus

Buddies: Students selected by both the Center

and the adult facilitators

Adult facilitators: School staff

When do Buddy Circles meet?

Meetings are scheduled weekly or bi-weekly

Lunch

Recess

In coordination with classroom teachers

"Being a buddy is basically being someone who helps others and you care for the whole school."

### How are Students Identified?



A new student (Tier 1)



A student exhibiting characteristics that inhibit their relationships or socialemotional development

-Experiencing challenges at school (Tier 2/3)

-Diagnosis (Tier 3)



A student experiencing difficulties outside of school (Tier 1/2)



A student that self-identifies (Tier 1/2)

How to be a Buddy Strengths & Needs Goals (Individual & Shared) Create a plan for where & how to support Introduce school language & traditions

Discuss outcomes Discuss changes Something special

#### Keetings 3 & 4: PROBLEM SOLVING

Share Buddy moments Review Problem-solving & Sharing Strategies Plan & Discuss Continue school language & traditions

## What We See

"I learned that I'm important, and everybody else is, in a Buddy Circle. So that's what helped me, and I think that's whats going to help other kids too."
